I am requesting permission to hold a kids' triathlon on Sunday, June 4, 2017. This event will be identical to the ones held for the previous twelve years.



Dear Mayor and Council:

On behalf of the Shuswap Cycling Club (SCC), I am writing to request that council adopt a motion to create a bicycle lane from 22nd Street NE along 11th Avenue NE continuing onto 16th Street NE to the intersection with 6th Avenue NE (please see attached map). The purpose of this bike lane is to connect the campuses of Bastion Elementary and Salmon Arm Secondary (Sullivan) with Salmon Arm Secondary (Jackson Campus). Creating an officially designated bike route in this area will empower and encourage the youth, and the greater population, of our city to get on their bike and create a safer route for them to navigate our community. It will also serve to create a corridor for all commuting cyclists that connects our downtown with the North and Southeast quadrants of the city. SCC is a member-based, non-profit organization that advocates for safe and convenient cycling facilities throughout the Shuswap. We believe installing bike lanes near schools and connector routes would improve safety for cyclists by reducing potential for conflict with an increasing volume of vehicle traffic.

Concerns regarding increased vehicular traffic from new building in the SCC believes cyclists will continue to use this route regardless of whether there are bike lanes. However, they will be increasingly at risk of injury.







Re: Crannog Ales - PID 015-263-754 Sorrento, BC

Thank you for your letter dated March 24, 2017 which provided information about Crannog Ales farm brewery.

The Agricultural Land Commission (ALC) advises that it has no objection to your existing brewery. Crannog Ales has been operating for 17 years in the ALR based on confirmation during a 1999 site visit with the ALC, that your small brewery operation met the ALR regulations of the day, and that no application was required.

The ALC believes that it is unreasonable to assess Crannog Ales against the recently adopted Section 2(2.3) of the <u>ALR Use, Subdivision and Procedure Regulation</u> and <u>ALC Policy L-21</u>, which require that 50% farm product be used to make the beer, provided the footprint of Crannog brewery and the ancillary uses do not expand. Should the brewery expand, or other ancillary uses be contemplated, an ALC non-farm use application is required.

The ALC appreciates your suggestions for amending the brewery regulation. However the ALC does not have the authority to amend the regulations. Suggestions for regulatory amendments should be directed to the Ministry of Agriculture.

Hops are not disregarded as a brewing ingredient but are a farm product that can be grown anywhere in the ALR. Although hops may play an important role in brewing and flavouring, they are a minor ingredient in beer. The Commission believes that it is important to maintain a strong link between agricultural production and an on-farm brewery. Small areas planted to hops or other flavourings (fruit, herbs etc.) does not ensure this link. In this regard, the process of making beer is very different from making wine from grapes.

Your correspondence and maps and this letter will be kept on file at the ALC and associated with your legal parcel for future reference. Be advised, should ownership of the land or the brewery business change, the current regulations (referenced above) will apply.

Dear Mayor Cooper and Council,

As reported to local government and police leadership over the past four years through our Annual Report and other outreach, the Board of Directors has been focused on advancing PRIMECorp in key areas such as financial stewardship, technological resiliency, service and security. We have made substantial advancement in all areas. On behalf of the Board of Directors, I write to you today with the purpose of providing updates on two key items in advance of the publication of PRIMECorp's 2016-2017 Annual Report, which will come later in the year.

At its most recent Board of Directors meeting, the Board passed Operating and Capital budgets for the period April 1, 2017-March 31, 2018. The provincial per officer levy will be \$1093.00, which represents a 3% increase in the current levy (approximately \$32 per officer). This is in alignment with the three-year forecasts PRIMECorp first communicated to you in 2014. At that time, the Board committed to maintaining a maximum 3% per officer levy through to the end of fiscal 2017-2018 and I am very pleased to report this has occurred each year. The levy includes 2% to cover current operating costs and 1%, which will continue to be put toward a reserve (accumulated surplus) for future required investments.

The Board's support of the reserve approach, combined with the operating surpluses from the past few years, has had a significant positive impact on our ability to undertake critical projects such as a geo-redundant data centre outside the Lower Mainland and a new Data Extraction Service without requiring a substantial increase in levies. PRIMECorp continues on its positive financial path and we remain committed to our goal to provide funders with certainty and stability with regard to projected levies so that they can be contemplated in future municipal budget cycles.

I also write with regard to the recent release of the report of the Office of the B.C. Auditor General on a 2016 IT security audit of PRIME-BC. As noted in our response letter to the Auditor General and published in its report, securing and protecting the information that British Columbia's police agencies enter into the PRIME-BC system is PRIMECorp's top priority.

The OAG advised PRIMECorp in 2013 that PRIME-BC was protected from external cyberattacks and we were pleased that the OAG again concluded in its 2016 audit that there are adequate perimeter controls protecting PRIME-BC from external attacks launched from the Internet. We have further work to do with regard to internal controls and have appreciated the OAG's acknowledgment of the significant improvements made over the past few years. We will continue to work to maintain vigilance with regard to the prevention, early detection and swift mitigation of any threat, internal or external, that may impact PRIME-BC.

The PRIMECorp board of directors has accepted all the recommendations of the OAG, and will, on a quarterly basis, monitor the progress of the implementation of the remaining recommendations, which are anticipated to be complete by the end of 2017.

As the custodians of the police information entered into the PRIME-BC shared system, PRIMECorp understands the special role it plays in maintaining the security of that information for both public safety and officer safety. The work

completed by the Auditor General will help PRIMECorp and all British Columbia police agencies face the increasing, and always evolving, security threats that face all organizations and governments in today's cyber world.

• We look forward to providing you a more fulsome report and all financial highlights in our 2016-2017 Annual Report.



June 3, 2017 marks SPARC BC's 20th annual Access Awareness Day!
