Hi Barb, yes please, the questions are now laid out a little clearer for Council members to reply.

Where does the money go from the sale of re usable cotton and paper bags including the taxes?

Why has Salmon Arm implemented this blanket bylaw?

Are fines necessary for retailers for supplying a plastic bag?

Is the revenue from fines if and when collected then used for green initiatives within Salmon Arm?

We have been constantly told to follow the science over the last 2.5 years, now it seems the science has changed again regarding reusable bags, has possible bacterial/viral transmission to food suddenly been eradicated in Salmon Arm and not other areas?

Remember washing everything including packaging not that long ago, excessive yes, but who is our resident scientist assuring us this removal of carrier bags is a good idea?

What has changed since 2020 with regards to our shopping habits, reusable bags and food hygiene to warrant the ban?

Are there other towns following this "trend" and if so what is their own reasoning behind it?

Has this Bylaw been approved as constitutionally legal at a Federal or Provincial level?

Was there a referendum asking Salmon Arm residents and retailers about the plan and obtaining their input through market research as to whether this was actually a good well thought out idea to blanket ban carrier bags?

Were other areas explored where plastic could be eliminated before this ban?

Askews for example used biodegradable environmentally friendly green bags, what seems to be the problem with these as they seem to meet and exceed all requirements?

I see some exemptions are permitted regarding meat, fruit, vegetables, biodegradable plastic carrier bags should be reinstated at grocery and food outlets where hygiene is paramount, would Council consider making additional exemptions to all foods/produce?

When you claim items will be cheaper as the cost of plastic bags wont be passed on to customers, how did you reach this dollar figure on your web page when in fact it now costs more?

I would like to see the Council make a constructive and sensible decision to reinstate biodegradable plastic carrier bags back to grocery stores and food/market outlets within Salmon Arm, this then puts the choice of accepting one of these bags, using or purchasing a reusable bag ours, and not for the City Council to decide, we all want to do our bit.

Once again, myself and the Board of the Shuswap Food Action Society would like to thank you for your ongoing support of our Downtown Farmer's market. This year, our market increased to 42 full-time vendors and 10 part-time vendors. Although we have not tracked the number of visitors, it has felt much busier than previous years and both our vendors and customers are happy.

Today, I am writing about our wish to re-start the popular "Applefest" this year. We believe this is an important community event that raises awareness of the farming cultural heritage of Salmon Arm, as well as showcases our local farmers and food producers. We are proposing to hold the event on Saturday, October 8th, which is Thanksgiving weekend, alongside our regular farmer's market. Hey Chris

Quick note, I have left a voice mail our event insurer, Kendal Moland Hub International here in Salmon Arm. We will add City of Salmon Arm to our Tuesdays Youth ride as additional insured. Due to Covid, we have not run any formal rides since 2019. Our Monday Lady's ride, ride all over, Rubber Head, South Canoe, Town Loops ie Down Town to in town park trails, Scotch Creek, Balmoral etc. The Wed night ride is no longer a big thing, and a formalized ride any more. Over the last few Covid summers, most of the Wed riders set up their own small groups. These people are out riding with their friends when it works for them, in smaller groups, and using different trails in our area.

Tuesday Youth Ride background info:

- We have an insurance rider with Hub, added to our general CGL, for the Skookum Cycle Tuesday Youth Ride, (or TYR). This covers our volunteer parent leaders
- The trails the TYR use are in South Canoe, sometimes the TYR may use Park Hill early season if the SC Trail system is under snow
- As part of our insurance coverage Skookum has put all the Youth Ride leaders through a training course on how to teach biking on trails to kids, the group leader is responsible for teaching the lesson of the day
- The parents of TRY riders are expected to provide the kids with proper fitting helmets, proper clothing/water for the day, and bikes in good working order with gears/brakes that work in trails. Our initial TYR night, back in the spring, we held a rider safety inspection of bikes and rider gear. As a double check.
- The TYR riders are organized into small groups, with kids that are of equal or similar riding ability and age

- Each group has at least one leader, some have two, and a parent helper or two, this helps with group dynamic and teaching of skills on trail
- Skookum does not charge for the TYR bike training and event, our goal is to encourage as many young people to get out and ride trails safely, with confidence and have fun. We cover the cost of training the leaders, and any costs of the events that happen over the season.
- TYR runs from April to end of September. This includes 12 weeks of on trail bike training and riding April to end of June, followed by summer fun rides July & August, and followed by the September fun race series. These are mini fun events for the kids, with a short bike ride after.
- At the end of September, dated for Sept 27 this year, we have year end TYR Celebration & BBQ for the kids/parents and TYR leaders. Which includes 40-60 fun door prizes for all the kids who show up. All costs are covered by Skookum Cycle

RE: Expanding emergency health services in your community

I'm pleased to be writing to let you know that BC Emergency Health Services (BCEHS) is expanding paramedic resources in your community.

This new update is part of the Ministry of Health's 2020 announcement of funding for the Rural, Remote and Indigenous Framework (RRIF). The goal of RRIF was to help improve access to health care for people living in rural and remote parts of the province during the COVID-19 pandemic. As part of RRIF, BCEHS deployed a surge response of paramedics in select communities. This deployment has been extended as work on our long-term sustainment plan for these resources has been underway.

Going forward, we are pleased to announce that your community is one of 31 communities that will be receiving more permanent full-time paramedic resources. More than half of these communities will see many of their on-call ambulances and associated paramedic positions converted to full-time regular resources. This will create more permanent jobs in these communities and will help stabilize our paramedic staffing, which in turn will improve responsiveness and emergency coverage.

Today's news means BCEHS is adding 208 full-time positions to the provincial ambulance service in rural areas.

At the ambulance station in your community, the on-call ambulance, referred to as a Kilo, will be converting to a fully staffed 24/7 ambulance, referred to as an Alpha. This will result in the addition of eight new permanent full-time positions in Salmon Arm.

Our local BCEHS Clinical Operations Director, Paul Swain would be happy to connect with you to discuss these exciting changes in more detail once the timing of the job postings and hiring details can be confirmed.
