Hi Linda,

Thank you for your March 22 letter to Mayor and City Council that was discussed at the April 8, 2019 Regular Council meeting. I have been asked to respond.

 Intersection cameras - the idea of installing cameras to control speeding and red light runners at our downtown intersection of the Trans Canada Highway (TCH) has been discussed for almost 10 years. Successive City Councils and our current Mayor have agreed with your perspective of this situation and have lobbied strongly for cameras. The Ministry of Transportation and Infrastructure (MoTI) has continually advised City Council that such cameras are not warranted for a number of technical reasons. MoTI has jurisdiction over the TCH corridor though Salmon Arm. In recent years, we have also seen the RCMP stepping up their traffic enforcement through this corridor.

MoTI in partnership with the City has devised a comprehensive safety plan for the TCH downtown corridor, which includes the relocation of traffic signals from Ross Street to 4 Street NE among various new turning lanes and advanced signalization. The City supports this project, and it is expected to be implemented prior to the summer of this year.

- 2) **Billboard signs** are not permitted by the City's Sign Bylaw. Where you see billboards when driving through Salmon Arm along the TCH is likely either First Nations land and/or within the TCH right of way, both of which are land outside of the City's regulatory jurisdiction.
- 3) **Casino sign** at the TCH and 10 Street SW intersection is situated on First Nations land and outside of the City's jurisdiction. If there are safety concerns, MoTI administers the Motor Vehicle Act and I am fairly sure it is aware of the sign. I will forward your letter and this e-mail to MoTI.

Dear Mr. Housden,

I am guessing at the spelling of your surname and hope I got it right. I am writing to you to express my extreme disappointment at the removal of bins of cardboard boxes in front of the checkout bays. I always used these boxes along with reusable cloth bags, on every shopping trip to carry my groceries.

I assume a customer complained that people fetching boxes were obstructing the exit area. In my mind this complaint is a bit far-fetched since there is plenty of room to pass.

<u>Considering city hall's move to ban single use plastic bags as of July 1st, alternatives</u> become necessary. Hopefully, shoppers will remember to bring cloth bags, but for those who don't, boxes are an ideal option. Switching to paper bags leads to more wasting of trees and they will often go to a landfill anyway. There is a cost to you in paying staff to break boxes down and be taken away by a recycling service. Surely there is a cost savings to have customers take boxes away for free.

I observed the exit area in front of the cash registers today and thought you could possibly rearrange the ice cooler and water bottle stand to allow some room for box bins.

I spoke to Mayor Harrison yesterday on this issue and he mentioned having had a recent meeting with you about the upcoming ban on plastic bags. He concurred that the availability of cardboard boxes for customer's use might be helpful.

On another matter, over the last few years I have donated dozens of grocery gift cards to Shuswap Second Harvest Food Bank before Christmas. The cards are distributed to families with children. Last year there were 31 such families plus more than 100 individuals. This year I will again be buying \$100 certificates for families with kids. I have checked with Shuswap Second Harvest head office manager Diana, that giving these gift certificates with the receipts directly to head

office for distribution to needy families will generate a charitable donation tax receipt for me. The advantage to you is that shoppers become habituated to your store as \$100 is most often spent over successive trips.

I ask that you consider donating several lower value grocery gift certificates to the food bank for the individual patrons. I believe that charity decisions within corporations are set early in the year. Likely a charitable donation tax receipt would be given to No Frills. I hope that your near end date food is being donated rather than trashed. Food Bank has a lot of volunteers who could assist with pick up and delivery of the food. The donation of gift cards would be a superb PR move which you could tout on your website. Last Christmas the Salmon Arm Observer photographed me and wrote a brief article about my donation in the newspaper.

Councillor Lindgren. Letter to City Council re Arthur Channer's letter.

It has recently been brought to my attention that Mr. Channer presented a letter to the city council with his opinion of the proposed Shuswap Performing Arts and Culture Centre. I have tried to contact Mr. Channer four times over the past week but he has not responded to my emails or phone calls. Mr. Channer spent a brief period of time (3 years) as one of the board members of Shuswap Theatre before leaving. I have been involved with the theatre group continuously for 41 years. Mr. Channer has had no contact with the Shuswap Society for the Arts and Culture, the organization that has been working on the performing arts centre for 14 years.

May I indulge the council in a brief correction of Mr. Channer's letter sent to you on 3/30/19.

The SSAC has studied not only the Revelstoke Theatre but at least two-dozen other theatres and performing arts centre. They have also visited many of those centers and discussed the pros and cons of the facility with the people that built and run them. The Revelstoke centre is only 275 seats (10 less than the Salmar Classic) and is operated by the Revelstoke Arts Council and the local School District. It is not really comparable to the proposed centre for Salmon Arm.

The SSAC is aware that the city has stated there will be no financial contribution for the operation of a performing arts centre, so the business concept has been designed to be financially self-sufficient. Over the years we have had four professional architects review our floor plans. We have had several financial professionals help us develop the business concept and about two-dozen "experts" from various fields speak to the group offering their advice and recommendations on many aspects of building and running a similar facility.

The SSAC has consulted with a dozen or more arts and cultural groups within the city as well as received very positive feedback from over 3000 local residents.

It is unfortunate that Mr. Channer, who was a lawyer, did not take the time to inform himself of the current status of the proposed multi-functional performing arts centre. I believe the city councillors are much better informed then Mr. Channer and would never hesitate to ask questions before drawing erroneous conclusions.

#### Re: Ride Don't Hide - Mental Health bike ride

Canadian Mental Health Association- Shuswap/Revelstoke branch (CMHA) will be holding its 7<sup>th</sup> annual Ride Don't Hide event on Sunday June 23, 2019 (<u>www.ridedonthide.com</u>). This is a national fundraiser and mental health awareness cycling event throughout Canada. Our local event will be starting and finishing in Salmon Arm. The purpose of this letter is to advise you about the event as well as seek appropriate permits and approvals.

We will be continuing with the same routes as previous years with minor changes to our longer routes. We are setting up a 10 km, 30 km, and 50 km routes. The three routes will leave from the Field of Dreams  $250 - 30^{\text{th}}$  Street SE heading south along Auto Road, the route details are:

- The 10km cyclists turn around at the Northern Plastics building,
- The 30km and 50km cyclists continue along 97B highway and turn right at Deep Creek Road. The 30km cyclists turn left onto Schoolhouse Road, while the 50km continue along Deep Creek Road, turning around at the parking lot of the Hullcar Community Hall just before the Deep Creek and Hullcar Road junction. The 30km cyclists follow Schoolhouse Road and turn left onto Mallory Road returning to Deep Creek Road. The 30km cyclists will then turning right returning to Highway 97B, back to Salmon Arm. Cyclist then turn right onto Mayfair Road and take an immediate left turn, continuing onto Mayfair Rd, then turn left onto Black Road. Cyclists then cross the highway onto Industrial Park and head back to the Field of Dreams via Auto Road SE. Once the 50km cyclists have turned around at Hullcar Community Hall, they ride back along Deep Creek Road, and then turn right onto Schoolhouse Road following the 30km route back to the Field of Dreams.





We plan to have 24 route volunteers, some stationed along the routes and some acting as a sweeper for cyclists. There will also be signs staggered along the routes to caution drivers to ensure the safety of cyclists. The route maps for cyclists are enclosed in this letter.

Besides the bike ride, we will also be holding a walking route through Little Mountain Park, which is a public park next to the Field of Dreams. The walking trail, approximately 3 km, will be clearly marked and trail volunteers will be available to support the safety of walkers and trail use.





On Wednesday, May 15 R.J. Haney Heritage Village & Museum, located at 751-Highway 97B opens for the season. 
### TogetherBC, B.C.'s First Poverty Reduction Strategy





### CSRD, RDNO, SPLATSIN MAKE PROGRESS ON RAIL TRAIL INITIATIVE

The opening words from Kukpi7 Wayne Christian of Splatsin accurately summed up the spirit of the entire Sicamous-to-Armstrong Rail Trail Corridor Interjurisdictional Governance Advisory Committee at a meeting held March 15 at the Splatsin Community Centre.

Kukpi7 Christian, who was elected Committee Chair, spoke of the value of advancing the project for the entire region, likening it to a team of horses.

"We need to pull together in the same direction. Now let's harness up and get going."

Clearly in agreement with Kukpi7 Christian's sentiment, the committee approved a series of recommendations to assist in advancing the project. These recommendations will be taken back to the Boards of both the Columbia Shuswap Regional District (CSRD) and the Regional District of North Okanagan (RDNO), as well as the Splatsin Band Council for approval. The CSRD approved the recommendations at the March 21, 2019 Board meeting and the RDNO Board approved the recommendations at their April 3, 2019, Board meeting. The recommendations will be part of the next Splatsin Council agenda.

Some of the recommendations set the foundation of the working relationship between the three partners, as well as the priorities and processes involved with the project. This includes a Memorandum of Understanding and Terms of Reference for the committees involved. The Committee endorsed the Terms of Reference and immediate establishment of a Technical Operational Committee to be comprised of staff from Splatsin, CSRD and RDNO. The Committee also endorsed appointing the Shuswap Trail Alliance to serve as Secretariat to the Governance and Technical Operational Committees.

To assist in addressing property and access issues in the CSRD and RDNO, the committee recommended empowering the Chief Administrative Officers (CAO) of both regional districts to make land tenure agreements under specific conditions.

There are already more than 200 known agreements dealing with land leases, crossings, access and easements to be addressed.

In order to fund the trail, grant applications totalling approximately \$13.4 million have been made to Provincial and Federal programs, with the outcomes pending.

The timeline of work on the project rests heavily on obtaining grant funding for project planning and development. As such, Kukpi7 Christian, along with CSRD Board Chair Rhona Martin and RDNO Board Chair Kevin Acton intend to arrange meetings with Federal ministers to lobby for funding approval.

The undeveloped Rail Trail Corridor remains closed to public use at this time.


The next meeting of the committee will be May 17, 2019.

**Dear UBCM Member Municipalities:** 

I am writing on behalf of Maple Ridge City Council to inform you of recent action taken by the Province of British Columbia that undermines the authority granted to municipal governments, and request that you pass a resolution to be forwarded to Premier Horgan and the Union of BC Municipalities (UBCM) expressing concern for the impact this action has on the roles defined for local government within the Community Charter (CC) and the Local Government Act (LGA).

By way of background, I share with you the recent experience of the City of Maple Ridge, where on two separate occasions, we have been subjected to the Province's unilateral action to bypass local government autonomy and public process, inconsistent with our local zoning.

In May 2018, the Province of BC made application to the City of Maple Ridge to rezone provincially-owned properties on 11749 & 11761 Burnett Street (as referenced in <u>Item 1108 of the May 22, 2019 Council Meeting Report</u>) to build purpose built supportive housing. Citizens attended a public meeting hosted by local MLAs and presented a 10,000 name petition against this application citing several considerations that made the site unsuitable including its proximity to a daycare, two schools, a seniors centre, and that the proposed model itself was inadequate to meet the complex mental health and addiction support services required, particularly persons coming from a camp environment. Following the public process, the City rejected the application. The Provincial Government responded to this decision by taking unilateral action to install housing through the Rapid Response to Homelessness (RRH) program on a nearby provincially-owned site on Royal Crescent, next to senior and low income housing, without any local consultation citing emergency measures were needed to ensure camp closure, which did not happen.

Since this Council took office in November 2018, we have taken swift and deliberate steps to address mental health and housing problems in our community, especially with regard to the ongoing presence of the St. Anne Camp that was first established in May 2017. We have endeavored to open positive channels of communication with the Province of BC to deliver a workable plan that addresses immediate and long term housing needs in our community, while respecting the views that have been clearly stated by local citizens. This began with post-election meetings in October 2018 with our local MP, MLAs, Fraser Health Authority, BC Housing and related non-profit service providers followed by Council's development of a Strategic Plan which includes direction to establish a Community Safety Plan as a major tenet of this work. These steps have been followed up most recently with a meeting in Victoria on February 25, 2019 with Ministers we felt needed to be present to assist us in our plan, that being Ministers of Health, Mental Health and Addictions, Poverty and Housing to discuss a broad range of problems including housing affordability, delivery of addiction and mental health services, community safety, and how we can move forward on these matters in Maple Ridge.

On Monday, March 4, just one week after that meeting, I received a phone call from the Housing Minister demanding that the City deliver a "<u>Social Housing Plan</u>" within five days to address short and long term needs, including providing immediate housing to facilitate the closure of the St. Anne Camp. Council immediately passed a resolution and then delivered on this request in seven days, with all related resolutions from Council to demonstrate our willingness and commitment to collaborate for a mutually beneficial outcome. The Plan was immediately rejected by the Province. The Province cited the unsuitability of the City's chosen property, despite City staff's assessment that the site could accommodate immediate housing needs to achieve camp closure. One week later, Minister Robinson announced publicity that RRH housing would be installed on Burnett Street, at the same location local residents and the previous Council had already rejected through the usual local application process.

Maple Ridge Council is gravely concerned by this second instance of the Provincial Government overriding local autonomy. The initial 53 housing units installed on Royal Crescent did not end the St. Anne Camp as promised by the Province, with units populated by both camp residents and other homeless individuals identified by BC Housing as a regional housing provider. In five months' time, the facility has experienced two deaths, and seen few moving forward as evidenced by statistics provided by the operator. Increasing crime at this location, the St. Anne Camp, and all other low barrier facilities in Maple Ridge indicates that the chosen model is not suitable to help people in a very serious state of poor mental health often coupled with significant substance misuse problems. Moreover, we have seen that other communities working to address closure of camps experienced similar results (e.g. Nanaimo, Victoria, Surrey and now Maple Ridge).

The emphasis that has been placed on low barrier housing in Maple Ridge, which includes approximately 950 rental supplements for untreated persons mostly suffering from substance misuse and mental health problems, has eliminated most of our affordable housing stock that is critical for people on low income, veterans, seniors, single parents and persons with disabilities. Furthermore, ongoing criminal activity has overtaxed all front line resources. These are real and significant local concerns that have been swept asjde by the Province's action.

What our community needs is a comprehensive health care facility focusing on mental and physical health, addictions recovery, and services to move people forward to a better place in their lives. We asked for this as part of our Social Housing Plan to the Province, a Plan which recognizes that local governments' role is to make decisions in the best interest of local residents. By acting unilaterally, the Province has imposed regional priorities at the expense of Maple Ridge citizens, and taken away our Council's ability to represent the best interests of our community.

We therefore ask you, our fellow local governments, to consider the ramifications of this unilateral action by the Province of BC to overrule municipal land use regulations and dispense with public consultation and collaboration with local government. In our view, it sets a dangerous precedent that jeopardizes the autonomy of all local governments in British Columbia, and could have repercussions for a wide range of sensitive matters that municipalities might consider, such as a waste incineration plant, a prison, a communication tower, etc. For projects such as these, it is particularly important that senior government initiatives go through proper process including site assessment and suitability evaluation, and for the Province of BC to respect the authority that has been granted to local governments to carry out due public process and represent the best interests of their communities in order to ensure approval. We appreciate that initiatives such as the RRH program may or may not be suitable in your community. Local government holds the authority and responsibility of making the right decisions based on a balance of all interests and weighing local and regional needs, while working with our senior government partners.

Enclosed you will find a proposed resolution that is strictly about the Importance of local government autonomy. We ask that you consider passing this resolution and forward a copy to Premier Horgan and the UBCM to let them know that local governments require the Province of BC to respect local democracy and work collaboratively with us to move forward on projects and programs of mutual concern that balance the Interests of all BC residents.
