Credentials.

I have been involved in theatrical productions for more than 40 years, all with community organisations. In 2006, the City Hall/Law Courts building was officially opened. The City used the borrowing referendum for a project which cost about \$12 million. The leasing of the building by the BC government for Court Services has provided a financial cushion. All long term major capital projects undertaken by a community the size of Salmon Arm have to be approached with caution and with the best possible advice from experts in the field.

The construction of the Revelstoke Performing Arts Centre should be an important local initiative to study. Also, Vernon Performing Arts Centre, while much larger than anything I can conceive for Salmon Arm is available for study.

A review of the planning and design and overall construction costs will prove illuminating, although l presume you are doing this. A modern black box theatre used for teaching and performance at the University of Calgary is also near enough for study.

But the most important aspect of a community cultural centre/ performance centre is, I believe, the ongoing operating budget which in my view includes debt retirement. These types of facilities are not like swimming pools, exercise centres, fieldhouses, or hockey arenas. This is where I part company with Mr Jacobsen and his group. I have known Mr Jacobsen since I was a director of Shuswap Theatre from about 2006-2009. His wishes are well known and he has continuously championed with others from that era the creation of a large scale facility something like the Vernon Performing Arts centre.

Road houses as the term is commonly used (South Okanagan Events Centre, North and South Alberta Jubilee auditoria) require much more than nominal annual funding by governments. The new YMCA building Calgary Crowfoot is another example of a modern multi purpose athletic complex.

The purpose of this letter is to ask Council to ensure it receives the best possible <u>professionally qualified</u> advice for any kind of performance/cultural/sports space. I believe that the Revelstoke space is the maximum size that should be considered for performance. Anything larger will be a long term financial burden.

If you want proof of pudding, look at the construction of a state of the art theatre facility for A.L.Fortune High School which is barely utilised by the school and not offered much to the community. The cost there about \$5million.

Several years ago, the league did have signs – albeit only a few – along the fence and at the time there was a fee for doing so. The current league executive cannot recall what the fee was per sign, how the fee was divided between the league and city, and what the slo-pitch league put the advertising funds raised towards. At our Annual General Meeting on March 5, 2019, the Executive agreed to start the process to try and start this initiative again.

To start, any potential client wishing to have a sign must contact the league executive for approval. This would ensure the signs are the correct size and quality and of course are appropriate for the ball fields. Any funds raised would be re-invested back into the league. Dear Mr. Mayor Harrison,

After months of participating in consultations, meeting and feedback sessions regarding the future recreation needs of the region and competitive swimming in particular, the Columbia Shuswap Selkirks Swim Club membership was excited to see the results of this process and to examine the recommendations presented by the City of Salmon Arm. We anticipated our feedback would have been heard and our needs would have been taken into consideration, along with the multiple other user groups involved in the process.

Our board and membership were severely disappointed to see the two options presented, neither option which serves the needs of our club, nor the other two swim clubs in the area: the Salmon Arm Sockeyes and the Salmon Arm Masters Waves. All three of our clubs are seeing a positive and increasing interest in swimming and are eager to serve our communities, enabling participation in this healthy, lifelong sport. However, examining the two proposed facility configuration options presented, the Columbia Shuswap Selkirks Swim Club is not able to endorse either recommendation as a viable way to support swimming in the region, now or for the next 30-60 years.

Swim programs require booking both time and space that works for the age and stage of various swimming populations. Currently, our three community clubs struggle to find time allotments that work to support our athletes' needs, within the limited space and time available. Our clubs work closely with one another and with Salmon Arm Recreation to figure out compromises and find time for athletes to train, but we currently do not have available time allotment or time slots to develop our athletes at the Provincial or National level. Regional, Provincial, National or International level swimmers in all three clubs need to swim significant number of hours per week, year round. Currently they find themselves competing with each other for scarce pool time, which is not creating an atmosphere of success for our

swimmers, in all stages and in all programs. Access to pool time and space is a key concern of all three clubs and causing stress in our community. The two proposals presented do not alleviate this crucial issue within and between our clubs, and do not create the conditions for optimal athlete development.

A 6-lane pool, as proposed in both options, is not a solution for the future of competitive swimming. However, an 8-lane pool would alleviate pressure on scheduling and create flexibility for concurrent programming to continue while athletes train. Additionally, an 8-lane pool is the minimal requirement to host sanctioned meets, which is a very real possibility for all three clubs. Currently the Selkirks can only host Jamboree or occasional Regional level meets, missing out on Provincial and National opportunities that bring significant revenue to communities which have the facilities to host such events. Ideally, as expressed in previous feedback sessions, building an 8-lane, 50 meter pool would be the outcome of this new 30-year regional facility development plan, but minimally, the community requires an 8-lane x 25 meter pool to host sanctioned events and for athletes to properly train. The proposed two lanes in the smaller pool for warm-up and cooldown are excellent, and we fully support that recommendation.

An 8 lane x 25 m pool facility with two cool down lanes would allow the Columbia Shuswap Selkirks Swim Club to host at least three, or possible five, sanctioned meets per year. Each meet brings 200-300 athletes and their families to the community to stay, eat and recreate for at least three days. The main swim season for our club is from October to June, and any events hosted in this time period brings the added benefit of increased tourism revenue during the low season.

We urge you to reconsider the recommended options you have put forward for the future of a regional recreational facility for Salmon Arm. Neither option presented creates added benefit for our club beyond the current configuration. Additionally, the Columbia Shuswap Selkirks Swim Club, and all the athletes involved, do not support shutting the pool down for one year to build a new facility. A one-year shutdown would mean our swim program and athletes would be set back significantly and possibly irreparably.

Beyond the Selkirks Swim Club's need for an appropriate swimming facility to support our athletes, we know that in order to be viable this plan needs to take into consideration the needs of multiple other user groups. This proposal needs to support the arts community, education and training providers, health care and other athletic groups. Additionally, any new regional centre needs to accommodate the projected population growth in the wider community for decades to come. A successfully implemented regional recreation facility plan will build the local economy, drive job creation, provide recreation opportunities for all ages and types of people, support athlete development, enhance arts programming, and create opportunities for training and development. This must be a collaborative plan and an investment in a better future for the entire region. We have a rare and wonderful opportunity to get this right for the next 30-60 years, and we implore you to reconsider the options you have presented to the community, and seriously consider the needs for future generations of citizens as you ponder this important decision.

SISS services extend beyond the direct benefits they provide to newcomers. Serving our clients effectively helps build individual as well as community capacity, and so contributes to the well-being of Salmon Arm and the Shuswap as a whole. 



February 28, 2019

Your Worship, Mayor Harrison,

As many as 55,000 British Columbians use a form of wheeled mobility, whether powered wheelchairs, scooters or manual wheelchairs. This number appears to have increased by 25% in a decade, and expected to increase as our population continues to age, technology continue to increase and facilitate individuals with disabilities to be mobile in their communities. BC is third among Canadian provinces in our population of users of wheelchairs and scooters, and higher than those populations in larger provinces of Ontario and Quebec.

Wheelchair accessible parking is an essential piece of community infrastructure that enables people with disabilities to be included and mobile in their communities. With changes made to the BC Building Code last fall, specifically the removal of accessible parking requirements, on December 10th, municipalities became responsible for the regulation of accessible parking. This means of course that municipalities will now need to adopt bylaws that address this for their communities.

Therefore, we are writing to you today to inquire as to whether or not your municipality has a bylaw in place and if so, to please provide us a copy of said bylaw, and if not, to strongly recommend the adoption of a bylaw that references the CSA standard.

The Canadian Standards Association CAN/CSA Technical Standard B651 Accessibility in the Built Environment (CAN/CSA B651) uses a robust omnibus built-environment accessibility guideline that is recognized nationally. The Federal Treasury Board's Accessibility Standard for Real Property policy has required this technical standard for all new and renovated federal government real property, including leased property, since October 1, 2014. This is also the standard used by the Rick Hansen Foundation (www.rickhansen.com/become-accessible) as the benchmark to audit existing facilities and provide guidance in the design phase of new buildings.

It is imperative that accessible parking be built to these standards so that adapted vehicles with ramp access, such as those used by individuals with powered mobility devices such as power wheelchairs and scooters can be accommodated. As individuals with disabilities and as legislators, we are especially interested in this issue and as such also offer any assistance we can to you should you need it. In addition, SPARC BC (www.sparc.bc.ca), has offered to provide assistance to any municipality interested in having more information about the specific types of disabilities and accessibility needs in your community to help support their local planning and decision-making including specific needs around accessible parking. We are confident that you and your municipality understand the business case for accessibility. The Conference Board of Canada's The Business Case to Build Physically Accessible Environments, February 2018 suggests that:

- There are 2.9 million Canadians living with a physical disability that impairs their mobility, vision, or hearing, representing 10 percent of the country's population.
- That this number will rise by 1.8 per cent annually over the next 13 years, nearly double the pace of the population as a whole.
- That real spending by this group is set to rise from \$165 billion in 2017 to \$316 billion in 2030, increasing from 14 to 21 per cent of the total consumer market.

So, we are very anxious to receive your response to our inquiry about your bylaws. We believe it is imperative that all municipalities large and small adopt a best-practice standard and work towards ensuring that it is adopted and enforced widely across both new and existing (as possible) infrastructure. Again we offer any assistance we can provide in developing or enhancing your new or existing bylaws in this regard.

Dear Premier Horgan,

I am writing on behalf of Victoria City Council, requesting favourable consideration and resolutions of support for the extension of vacancy taxation authority to local governments.

At the January 17, 2019 Council Meeting, Council approved the following resolution:

WHEREAS the Province of British Columbia responded to a housing affordability crisis in 2016 with legislation empowering the City of Vancouver to introduce a surtax on vacant residential properties, resulting in \$38-million in revenues for that community in 2018 and creating a strong disincentive to leaving properties vacant;

AND WHEREAS communities across British Columbia face housing affordability pressures, while a portion of the housing supply in all communities remains vacant, including properties that have remained derelict for years or decades;

AND WHEREAS vacant and derelict buildings pose substantial risks in terms of public safety in communities, as well as liveability and desirability for nearby and adjoining neighbourhoods and properties;

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED THAT the Province of British Columbia extend the authority to introduce a surtax on vacant residential properties to local governments across British Columbia, providing communities with the discretion to decide whether to introduce an additional tax to discourage vacant and derelict buildings, and encourage the occupancy, maintenance, and improvement of buildings to address housing affordability and public safety.

WHEREAS almost 500,000 individuals in BC experience food insecurity, and Canada remains one of the only Organization for Economic Co-operation and Development (OECD) nations without a national school food program. And, Canada's current patchwork of school food programming reaches only a small percentage of students.

WHEREAS school food programs have been shown to increase children's consumption of vegetables, fruits and other healthy foods and decrease the consumption of unhealthy ones; improve students' mental health, including reductions in behavioural and emotional problems; improve cognitive skills and increase scholastic success.

At the February 7, 2019 Council Meeting, Council approved the following resolution:

Resolution: Observed Inhalation Sites for Overdose Prevention

WHEREAS British Columbia is currently experiencing an unprecedented public health emergency due to an unpredictable and highly-toxic drug supply;

WHEREAS smoking or inhalation is the second most common mode of consumption among all people who have died from a suspected illicit drug overdose and the most common mode of consumption among men and those between the ages of 15 and 29;

WHEREAS observed consumption services (i.e. supervised consumption services and overdose prevention services) are evidence-based harm reduction approach shown to reduce overdose-related harm;

WHEREAS there is not adequate access to observed consumption services that provide space for inhalation where communities are facing crisis;

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED THAT to ensure that people at risk of overdose across B.C. have access to observed consumption services that provide space for inhalation, that the Province of British Columbia work through local communities, Health Authorities across the Province, the Ministry of Mental Health and Addictions and the Ministry of Health to fund and provide these services as part of a holistic response to the public-health emergency, including prevention, treatment, and recovery.

At the February 7, 2019 Council Meeting, Council approved the following resolution:

Resolution: Safer Drug Supply to Save Lives British Columbia

WHEREAS It has been two years since BC declared a public-health emergency due to increased overdoses, yet the death toll for those consuming substances continues to rise due to an unpredictable and highly-toxic drug supply;

WHEREAS people with opioid use disorder, a chronic relapsing medical condition, are at high risk of overdose-related harms including death;

WHEREAS an estimated 42,200 people inject toxic substances in British Columbia;

WHEREAS it is not possible for the treatment system to rapidly increase services fast enough to manage this number of people as "patients" within a medical treatment model given the many challenges in achieving and retaining the people on opioid use disorder treatment;

WHEREAS people at risk of overdose in British Columbia do not have access to a safer alternative to the unpredictable, highly-toxic drug supply;

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED THAT, in an effort to save lives and reduce harm due to an unpredictable and highly-toxic drug supply, and as part of a holistic response to the public-health emergency, including prevention, treatment, and recovery, that the Province of British Columbia work with local communities, Health Authorities across the Province, the Ministry of Mental Health and Addictions, and the Ministry of Health ensure that people at risk of overdose harm have access to safer alternatives.

At the January 31, 2019 Council Meeting, Council approved the following resolution:

WHEREAS old-growth forest has significant economic, social and environmental value as wildlife habitat, tourism resource, carbon sink, drinking watersheds and much more;

AND WHEREAS old-growth forest is increasingly rare on Vancouver Island and current plans on provincial Crown land call for logging the last remaining old-growth forest, outside of protected areas, Old-Growth Management Areas, and similar reserves, over the next 10-20 years;

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED THAT the old-growth forest on provincial Crown Land on Vancouver Island be protected from logging, beginning with a moratorium and followed by amendments to the Vancouver Island Land Use Plan;

AND BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED THAT the Provincial government work with First Nations, local communities, labour organizations and industry to pursue a just transition and expanded economic opportunities through sustainable management of second-growth forests and value-added production of forest products.

At the February 7, 2019 Council Meeting, Council approved the following resolution:

Resolution: Revitalizing Island Rail

WHEREAS one of the conditions of the original Order-in-Council establishing the Esquimalt and Nanaimo (E&N) now Island Corridor Foundation (ICF) railway corridor is that if the corridor is no longer needed or used for railway purposes, it goes back to the original owner;

AND WHEREAS assembling a similar multi-modal corridor connecting the Alberni Inlet to the Comox Valley to Greater Victoria in the context of current land values and land uses would be impossible to replicate;

AND WHEREAS repair of the railway infrastructure can only reasonably be accomplished by way of capital investment from senior levels of government, in co-operation with First Nations and local governments and respecting first nations interests

AND WHEREAS rail transport and a parallel trail system are integral sustainable transportation options for Indigenous and non-indigenous peoples in the context of climate change, including the option of electrified rail for the sustainable movement of people and goods on the island;

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the Province of British Columbia take immediate actions to provide sufficient funding in a timely manner to restore the railway infrastructure of Vancouver Island and ensure that the corridor remains intact and available to future generations of Indigenous and non-indigenous peoples.

WHEREAS the world's leading climate scientists have warned that we have less than 12 years to meet our climate targets, and early action is required to avoid significant costs and impacts to social and environmental well-being in our communities, and worldwide.

AND WHEREAS local governments are uniquely positioned to enable this mobilisation effort, in a coordinated and integrated fashion across sectors, enabling individual action with timely and accurate information, incentives, directions, coordination, tools, targets and scalable, impactful programs.

AND WHEREAS local governments GHG reduction plans will be effectively and expeditiously realised through a dedicated focus on cutting the most impactful GHG sources, including: retrofitting existing buildings to high-efficiency standards; renewable electricity; elimination of fossil fuel heating sources; shifting people to transit, active transportation, and renewably powered mobility options; and the electrification of commercial and passenger vehicle fleets.

AND WHEREAS the complexity and pace/progress of GHG reductions in both local governments and community require additional resources and planning to reduce risks of missing interim and longer GHG and renewable energy targets.

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that local governments call on the Governments of Canada and British Columbia to pursue the following immediate sector actions to promote and enable GHG reductions and realize important social and economic co-benefits:

- 1. Make available all ICBC municipal vehicle km/make/model/fuel economy information.
- 2. Continue the development and implementation of world-class low carbon fuel standards.
- 3. Fully invest in delivery of the zero-emission vehicles sales targets as established in the CleanBC Plan.
- 4. Continue progressive and direct funding programs and partnerships for municipal lowcarbon initiatives, including building retrofit, transportation, waste management and other priority and shared GHG reduction programs.
